ENTERED IN THE POST OFFICE AS SECOND-CLASS MATTER.

The disarming of the Indians is no fools play. They will not lay down their arms without a struggle and the sooner it comes the better.

They are talking of colonizing Arizona with Arabians. The New York immigration bureau is doing the talking while the advance agent is in Tombstone trying to find out who robbed him of one hundred dollars.

NOGALLES which six years ago was unknown excepting to the antelope and coyote now has for one of its permanent residents, Jesse R. Grant and family, the former being a son of Ex-President Grant. Tell this to a foreigner and he would immediately say "poor fellow" and then dilate upon the ingratitude of republic.

THE census reports give 10,618 family schedules in regard to the Jews, including 80,630 persons. Two-thirds of them keep one or more servants. A comparison of the birth and death rates with those of native born parents indicate that the birth rate is decreasing and the death rate increasing with prolonged residence in this country, but the general results indicate that the Jews here retain many of the peculiarities which have been noted among them in Europe.

COMMISSIONER of immigration Black of Tucson has become the target for the editorial writer on the citizen. It does him up in the following style.

"It is a notorious fact that during the present incumbency of the office of commissioner of immigration he has done little of nothing to promote the duties of his office, if we except possibly the jerking off of some few hundred covers from the printed reports of his predecessor Tom Farish and putting on his own name. During this period Mr. Black has drawn, or been entitled to draw in the neighborhood of \$10,000."

AT A Special meeting of the mayor and common council it was determined to follow out the law in relation to the payment of \$2000 worth of bonds held by D. A. Sanford. The law requires their payment Jan. 1st. of each year and had the law been carried out in the past there would have been no debt against the city with the exception of a small floating debt, and instead of seeing warrants selling for 25 cents on the dollar they would have been on a par with county warrants, which are considered gilt edged paper. The law as it has stood since 1883 required that \$3600 in bonds should be paid each year together with the entire interest. The present board of councilmen in carrying out the law shows a disposition to start on the new year with a course mapped out which if persevered in, will soon bring our city, whether in its present form or some other, into the list of first class governed municipalities.

The officials of Cochise county who retire from their places of trust which they have held during the past two years, do so with the best wishes of the people in general whom they have so faithfully served. The business like methods which have characterized the administration has benefited the taxpayers in a marked degree. Although mistakes have been made they were not against the taxpayer, but in his favor. In the retirement of Sheriff Slaughter, the county, and the entire southwest loses a faithful officer and an unexcelled sheriff. The PROSECUTOR trusts and believes that the incoming administration will not be behind their predecessors in qualities which go to make up honest and earnest representatives of the people's interests. They take the reins under the most auspicious circumstances and the pathway before them which will not be strewn with roses, has been well trodden by good intentions and will be easier to follow for that reason. The PROSECUTOR wishes them a happy new year, flanked with the hope that it will not become its duty as a public journal to find fault with the management of affairs under the new regime.

MCKINLEY DID IT.

How His Bill Pecked a Hole in a Big Arizona Enterprise.

M. M. O'Gorman left for Los Angeles Tuesday morn. When asked for information regarding the intent of the big company which he represents, he said:
"When the company was organized, Ex-gov. Perkins, of California, Richard Gird and others contemplated in the near future to stock the range in La Noria with a thousand head of cattle. Our idea was to erect a mammoth slaughtering house on the line somewhere in the neighborhood of Sonora. We would have cold storage rooms on a large scale and built a branch from the N. M. & A. to the works. The proposition was to ship fresh beef in refrigerator cars to California and other points. It was not until the present time that we found ourselves in condition to handle this immense undertaking and had it not been for the McKinley bill we would have started in on this work this winter. My visit to Tombstone at this time was to close up the affairs of the company as we do not see any immediate prospect of the ten dollar duty being taken off. We will let things rest for a couple of years, although the scheme has not by any means been abandoned. I am not finding fault with the McKinley bill for I believe in protection, I believe still more in reciprocity with Mexico." Thanking Mr. O'Gorman for his information we gazed at space and wondered how the McKinley bill had benefited Arizona.

NEWS BY WIRE.

A World dispatch from Ottawa, Ontario, says it is reported in official circles here that the United States government will probably seek redress through the German government for the recent poisoning on the islands of Behring sea by the sealing Schooner Atele.

Chief of Police Coyne, of San Diego, has received a letter from a man visiting in the city from Independence, Mo., informing him that the writer had met face to face on the streets of San Diego, the notorious Missouri bandit, Jim Cummings, for whom there is a standing reward, the reward dead or alive.

In the course of lectures which was inaugurated last year by Chauncey M. Depew under the auspices of the Press club of Chicago, the next address is likely to be given ex-President Cleveland. Mr. Cleveland told the financial secretary that he would endeavor to arrange his affairs so as to enable him to accept the club's invitation late in February or early in March.

At Hewarden castle the 51st birthday of Hon. Wm. Ewart Gladstone was celebrated with quiet rejoicings. Telegrams of congratulation and large numbers of presents arrived during the early part of the day from all parts of Great Britain, and there were also received several congratulatory cable messages from the United States.

The latest from the seat of war in the Bad Lands shows the fight with Big Foot's band to have been a slaughter of nearly every Indian in the band. The Seventh Cavalry had been anxious for a chance to even old scores with this band and no persuasion could deter them from fighting to the death every Indian in sight. The policy to be followed up is to disarm all of the Sioux while the lesson of Monday is still fresh. If the worst comes to worse the fighting will be continued.

Mr. M. S. Snyder offers a reward of \$300 for the arrest and conviction of the party or parties who attacked and robbed him Monday night in Tucson.

THE EXPENSES of running the county last year amounted to \$42,461.45. Of this amount the Sheriff's office took \$6,647.64, the hospital \$5676.97 and the "Poor Printer" but \$1148. This latter amount is the smallest ever paid by Cochise County in one year for its printing.

The amount ordinarily paid prior to 1889 was four to six thousand dollars. The PROSECUTOR does not point to this showing with pride but with a sense of shame in having taken such a pitance for work which cost fifty percent more to execute. There is but one thing connected with it which is at all pleasing and that is that a paper can exist in Tombstone more profitably by not having the county work than by having it, and that the business men and others will sustain a fair paper by their support.
